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A Message from the Interim Dean

May I take a minute to cheer our MPH students and graduates and their success in the national Certification in Public Health (CPH) exam? Historically we had volunteers take the exam, but it is now a requirement for all MPH students after they have completed their five core courses. Seven students of the eight who took the exam for the first time in February passed, and that 88% rate is higher than the national rate of 68%. Furthermore, to date, 91% of our students and alumni have passed the exam the first time. The office of the Dean is planning

to take a deep dive into CPH data (e.g., by exam content areas) and provide analysis to the Academic Policy and Curriculum Committee (APCC) for their consideration regarding class content, or changes to CPH review sessions. We also listen to student and alumni surveys regarding competencies. In combination with CPH performance, this data may help us adjust programs, and increase student success.

We will end this academic year with the continuing hard work of the joint faculty Bylaws Committee, which plans to produce a final draft for faculty discussion and a vote next fall. We expect about 90 total primary faculty when we come together as a School. Because of new faculty title guidelines for partners, OHSU will provide PSU SPH primary faculty with equivalent OHSU faculty titles (0% FTE). That change assures SPH faculty equal access to the research support, library services, and the tram at OHSU. Human Resources at PSU and OHSU also initiated procedures for SPH staff and deans to be in both university HR systems. This allows joint functions to operate in an increasingly seamless manner.

We also are building capacity to help with field experiences. We conducted demonstrations of a new internship management system, symplicityTM which tracks student progress and assists program directors and coordinators in managing field and culminating experience. After researching and talking to people about best practices, we chose symplicityTM, and we're excited to implement it next year. An important SPH goal was to have a website that sits outside of both universities' sites. Please visit www.ohsu-psu-sph.org and send us your feedback. The site is live but will continue to grow over the next year. Please also familiarize yourself with the founding dean search posted on the website, and stay involved in this selection process when the Search Committee asks you to participate and provide feedback on candidates.

Last week, I answered school transition questions from a PSU faculty candidate. As I went into detail on some of the more intricate details of our collaborative research model, the candidate's eyes began to glaze over. Socially, this was not the best way to instill excitement for our collaborative endeavor, so I quickly summed up by saying that there is a lot of work behind the scenes, and what we aim for is to make the faculty and student experiences as seamless and easy as possible. We are happy to provide the excruciating details, but what students and faculty want is for the important operations to work.

If you know the film Wizard of Oz, this might sound suspiciously like "pay no attention to the people behind the curtain." Over the next weeks, the Office of the Dean will send out short messages based on faculty responses and questions in a recent survey on the SPH transition. We will also host drop-in sessions for you to ask questions and discuss concerns in person, offer to attend your meetings to elucidate accreditation and host two accreditation orientation meetings. We are here to answer your questions and alleviate your concerns as the SPH continues to grow toward our goal of being a joint school.

Carlos Crespo, Interim Dean of Undergraduate Affairs PSU Community Health Update and Excitement for the New School

Carlos Crespo, PhD is the Interim Dean of Undergraduate Affairs, and is currently leading the charge to get the faculty in PSU's Community Health prepared to move over into the School of Public Health.

Currently, the proposal for the faculty move is with the Education and Policy Committee of the PSU Faculty Senate. Dr. Crespo admitted that they have some questions, one that he is aware of is access to advising, particularly the ratio of students to advisors. Once these questions are answered, the Faculty Senate will vote on the proposal, either at their May or June meeting. If approved, the faculty could move into the school as early as July 1. Dr. Crespo added that there is a chance that some tenured

faculty could opt out of the move. So far, that count is four. Those faculty will find a new home in CUPA or elsewhere at PSU.

When asked what he thought the biggest advantage of the new school would be, Dr. Crespo lauded the diversity that will come with the joining of the universities programs and faculty. OHSU has a major focus on medicine and research, while PSU focuses on teaching. Bringing faculty together from these different institutional backgrounds will provide many different points of view and make for a more diverse way to serve students and the public health community. Also, Dr. Crespo noted, combining the education programs will diversify the student body, as there will be undergraduate, MPH and PhD students.

"I think it's a great opportunity to be able to create our physical space from scratch, from the ground up", Dr. Crespo also noted as something people should be excited about. Having access to both libraries will also make for better access to mixed methods research, and will add to the diversity of each student's experience.

As far as what's going on right now in his world at PSU, Dr. Crespo noted that they are in the midst of a search for a new faculty member, who will move over to the SPH with the rest of the group. They are gearing up for graduation, and looking forward to the changes coming in the next few months.

Self Study Update

The preliminary self-study will be mailed to CEPH on April 28. Soon, the self-study and the electronic resource file will be posted for review by faculty, staff and students.






Transition Survey Results


Total responses
